Roadmap to the Republican Party of Texas State Convention

WHAT IS A DELEGATE?

Delegates are grassroots activists who participate in shaping the direction, leaders, priorities, and platform of the Republican Party of Texas (RPT). Delegates may introduce vaccine choice resolutions and can attend the State Convention. All delegates must be chosen or elected by their County/Senate District Conventions (See Step 2 below).

WHY BE A DELEGATE?

The Republican Party of Texas State Convention is where the Party adopts their principles and core values into their Party Platform and Priorities and elects Party leadership. This is a critical meeting for the medical liberty movement in Texas in particular as the RPT is the only statewide political party that specifically recognizes the fundamental principles of parental rights, conscientious objections, and vaccine choice. The state convention is our opportunity to inject planks, resolutions, and priorities into the state party's guiding documents which protect and advance medical privacy, informed consent and vaccine choice.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO ATTEND THE RPT STATE CONVENTION?

Anyone who is a registered voter and voted in the Republican Primary or is willing to take an oath of affiliation, and has been duly elected by their local conventions (see Precinct and County/Senate District Convention details below).

WHEN WILL I BE NEEDED?

There are three levels of involvement where YOUR passion for medical liberty is needed.

STEP 1

PRECINCT CONVENTIONS: – *After the March 3 Primary*

Attend your 2026 Precinct Convention. Precinct Conventions will be held sometime between when the polls close on Primary Election Day (March 3) and before the start of the County/Senate District Conventions on March 28.

Precinct Conventions are generally easy and short; you can run to be a delegate at the next convention, and those present vote on delegates as well as on resolutions to be considered at both the County/Senate District Conventions and the State Convention (see Step 2).

STEP 2

COUNTY/SENATE DISTRICT* CONVENTIONS – *March 28*

If you are elected to be a delegate at your Precinct Convention, you then attend the convention of your local County or Senate District Convention. These conventions last one full day and consist of voting on policies and procedures for the State Convention, including medical liberty resolutions. You can also run to be a delegate to the State Convention (See Step 3).

*A County Convention is held when the county is completely within one state senatorial district. A Senate District (SD) Convention is held when the county is divided between two or more state senatorial districts.

STEP 3

RPT STATE CONVENTION – *June 11-13, 2026 in Houston*

As a delegate to the RPT State Convention, you can testify before various committees on the importance of protecting and advancing medical privacy, informed consent and vaccine choice. Additionally, you can vote on the entire platform and legislative priorities, as well help decide who will represent you within the state party. If you choose to participate in committee hearings, you will need to plan to arrive at the state convention earlier in the week.
